Why Girlguiding?

This role is your chance to play a key part in supporting members aged 16-30 to do their Queen's Guide award (QGA) – the highest award in Girlguiding.

Why do we love this role?

This truly is a feel-good role. As QGA country/region coordinator you'll work with county QGA coordinators, supporting them to help members doing this challenging award and their mentors. You'll work in your country/region team to oversee the award process and promote the award throughout your country/region.

Some of what you'll do:

- Communicate with and support county QGA coordinators (or commissioners where there's no coordinator in post).
- Answer queries about the award.
- Be enthusiastic about the QGA and aware of the benefits that getting involved can bring.
- Support counties to recruit county QGA coordinators.
- Communicate with other advisers and coordinators involved in programmes that overlap with the QGA, like Duke of Edinburgh and peer education.
- Share and promote opportunities for events members can take part in to help earn their QGA.
- Meet with the team involved with the QGA in your country/region.
- Keep up-to-date with the QGA programme.

What training and support do you get?

- You'll go to meetings led by Girlguiding HQ where you'll get support to run the QGA programme in your country/region.
- You'll be able to go to meetings and events to share information and best practice.
- We have a clear complaints procedure and support to help sort out problems or disagreements.

What skills do you need?

- An open and approachable manner
- To be reliable and trustworthy
- · Commitment to your ongoing personal development
- To work as part of a team
- Excellent communication skills
- A desire to motivate and inspire girls, young women and adult volunteers from a broad range of backgrounds
- Demonstrable knowledge of the QGA programme
- You don't need any professional qualifications

- Promoting youth awards in your country/region
- Working knowledge of the QGA programme
- Communication and team working skills, thanks to working with other volunteers in the QGA network and your country/region
